Eli Coy

Harry Eli Coy, always known as 'Eli' (presumably to distinguish him from his father with whom he shared a name),

was born in Diamond Cottage, Harby on February 9th 1903, the son of Harry and Elizabeth Coy and the younger brother of (Mary) Alice. As children, Eli and Alice both attended Harby village school.

Those who knew Eli always described him as 'quite a character'. For instance when still in his teens, he married Mary Ellen 'Nellie' Bilby, and apparently his family and friends only knew of the wedding when they heard the Church bells ringing! The couple went on to have 2 children, Margaret and Joyce, and five grandchildren – apparently Eli was a very strict grandfather!

Eli was both intelligent and mechanically minded — on one occasion he fitted a petrol engine to an originally electric powered lawnmower which he 'drove' to Starbucks petrol station to fill up, complete with his pipe in his mouth. He was also skilled at woodworking and made many items including candlesticks and turned bowls on his lathe.

During the war Eli was a member of the Royal Observer Corps, a civil defence organisation intended for "the visual detection, identification, tracking and reporting of aircraft over Great Britain".

Eli spent all his working life at the Ironstone works in and around Eastwell, Eaton & Harby. He started by showing visitors round the Ironstone Works and was then promoted to chauffeur, from where he progressed initially to Manager of Eaton quarry and then to Manager of both Eaton and Eastwell quarries. He was a strict but well respected manager, and a familiar figure, seldom seen outside without his trilby hat and pipe.

It was whilst he was Manager of Eaton and Eastwell quarries that he came by Roman items discovered at Goadby

Marwood, primarily an amphora containing a quantity of coins. He sent the coins, and most of the other finds, to a

Mr Liddell at Leicester Museum for inspection. The amphora had been repaired, presumably in Roman times, with triangular lead strapping, and had the maker's name stamped on the bottom. Sadly it was dropped in more recent times and broken beyond repair.

Also at Goadby Marwood, the skeleton of woman and child were discovered at the bottom of a dry well.

Eli died in 1983 aged 80, and is buried in Manthorpe churchyard, next to his wife and daughters. Sadly his wealth of experience and most of his knowledge of the Ironstone Works went with him.

Eaton Quarries ("Waltham")

1958 was a year of depression in the iron-ore industry, and nearly all quarries suffered short-time working or periods of closure. "Waltham" (to use its familiar name) with its relatively small output and greater distance of haulage to the furnaces, was one of the first to feel the axe and was closed in February 1958 - "temporarily" to quote the local Press. The men were found work in other nearby quarries. There was some talk of reopening with road haulage, but nothing was done in this direction and later events would seem to rule out revival in any form.

16 August 1960 - End of an Era

The whole proceedings on the 16th were filmed in colour and in black-and-white by Mr. W.A. Camwell, ensuring a permanent record of an historic event - the passing of the last ropeworked ironstone incline in this country. The full tubs were lowered down the incline in the usual way, with empties coming off at the top alongside. At half-past-two the last full wagon was attached to the cable by Mr. Coy. A garland of wild flowers - freshly picked hawkweed and marjoram from the cutting - was placed on the loaded ore, and the inscription "LAST TRAM 16/8/60. Running 1880 - 1960" chalked on the side of the tub. With no more full wagons going down, empties were detached at the bottom, the last dozen or so being "spragged" and then pushed on to the tippler by hand. At twenty-past-three the last tub was emptied into the B.R. wagon below, and the incline was clear of wagons - a strange sight and, as Mr. Coy put it, "the end of an era".

BEAU LINLEY'S GOADBY MARWOOD ROMAN COIN COLLECTION By Steve Wells

When Richard asked me to photograph a collection of Roman bronze coins held by Mr Beau Linley, little did I know just how much my photographic and subsequent digital processing skills would be stretched in order to record, identify, and finally produce a meaningful report about his collection. But it in the end it turned out to be a most satisfying, enjoyable, interesting, and enlightening process.

The collection was housed in a bespoke mounting panel which was sealed between two sheets of glass, making direct access to the coins impossible, and presenting me with the problem of how to avoid any unwanted reflections appearing in the photographs. However, I overcame this by setting the remote flash at an acute angle and mounting the camera on a copy stand to prevent camera shake. I photographed the entire collection, firstly as a whole, then each coin individually, both sides.

This was followed by a considerable amount of work using Photoshop imaging software, involving cutting, pasting, enhancing, re-sizing, rotating, repairing, and merging the images to present side-by-side views of each individual coin so that, when printed, the task of identification could then begin.

Wendy Scott, the Leicestershire Portable Antiquities Scheme Finds Liaison Officer provided phenomenal help, encouragement and assistance in the identification process, going so far as to allow me very privileged access to the original Goadby Marwood Coin Hoard held in storage by the Leicestershire Museum Service, where we both could directly compare Beau's coins with those acquired by the museum in 1953. (Both the original hoard and Beau's collection are in extremely good condition, thanks mainly to them being unearthed prior to the extensive use of corrosive pesticides and fertilisers, so the details on the coins are generally very well defined).

Armed with this new-found knowledge and helpful pointers to reference sources gleaned from Wendy, the identification process progressed quite well and is now almost complete. Further professional advice is required to identify just 7 of the 120 coins, which may be provided by expert staff at the British Museum once the PAS recording process is under way.

THE REPORT.

According to the PAS 'Introduction to Roman Coins', Roman coins can span many centuries in England, from pre-imperial Republican issues (212-27BC), to early 5th Century AD pieces, and can be split into 4 main issue types:

Republican (212 - 27BC) silver denarii (singular denarus), issued by magistrates, called moneyers, with various busts and reverses.

Early Imperial (27BC - c AD250) usually silver denarii or large copper alloy issues.

Radiates (c AD238 - 296) silver to bronze coins with radiate (crown of spikes) busts (the empresses have a crescent moon behind their bust).

Nummi (singular *nummus*) (AD294 - 5thcentury) increasing use of the diademed (ornate headband) bust with fewer standard reverse types. Silver *siliquae* (singular *siliquae*) are quite common in the period AD355 - 402.

Beau's collection comprises Roman bronze Radiates, Nummi, and 'Barbarous Radiates' (copies), from 14 different emperors, and date from AD253 to 337.

In his 1954 Leicestershire Archaeological and Historical Society publication 'Roman Discoveries at Goadby Marwood', Robert Abbott lists all the coins found in the original hoard in 1953, and he proposed a concealment date of circa AD280, based on the latest coins within the hoard being of the emperor Probus (reign AD276 – 282).

Beau's collection contains coins from generally the same emperors, with a few exceptions, but what is a little surprising is that the latest coins in his collection are of the emperor Constantine I (306 – 337AD), and of Licinius (AD308 – 324).

This throws up a few questions:

Did these coins come from the same hoard, or was there another one? (There are tales, apparently, of workmen carrying barrow-loads of coins away from the site!)

Did Beau's coins come from the very top of the hoard pile (being the latest additions), before the rest of the hoard was taken to the museum? (In which case, it would put the date of concealment to circa 315AD, and would mean re-writing the history books).


Or has the original collection been added-to over the years?

We can only speculate.







Bibliography

RIC is the abbreviation of 'Roman Imperial Coinage', a British catalogue of Roman Imperial currency from 31BC to 491AD. It is the standard work for numismatic identification of coinage.

The RIC is the successor to previous works by Henry **Cohen**. He is perhaps best known for his two fundamental works on ancient numismatics: the first, published in 1854, dealt with the Roman Republican coinage, while the second, issued in 8 volumes from 1859 to 1868, focused on the coinage of the <u>Roman Empire</u>, from <u>Pompey</u> to Romulus Augustus (49 BC - 476AD).

RSC relates to the 5 volumes of 'Roman Silver Coins' by Seaby, Sear & King, produced between 1952 and 1989. These are comprehensive volumes dealing exclusively with Roman silver coinage, one of the most popular series among collectors of ancient coins. Numbering mainly follows Cohen.

The **Cunetio** Hoard is one of the largest hoards of Roman coins found in Britain. It was discovered in 1978 at the site of the Roman town of Cunetio, near modern-day Mildenhall, Wiltshire, and consisted of 54,951 low value coins. The coins were contained in a large pot and a lead container. The coins are now in the British Museum and the pot is on display at the Wiltshire Museum in Devizes.

David R **Sear** is the author of the 5-volume standard handbook 'Roman Coins and their Values' for collectors of ancient Roman coinage.

The majority of this additional reference information was obtained from the 'Wildwinds' on-line resource.


By sharing the stories that we uncover from our field survey activities we hope to inform a better understanding of how our farming landscapes evolved over the centuries.

On completion of the field survey activities, a field survey report is produced. One copy is presented to the landowner, and a further copy is sent to the relevant County Historic Environment Record where it is allocated a unique reference number and then a copy is sent on to the relevant Finds Liaison Officer to ensure that all related findings are uploaded on to the National Portable Antiquity Scheme Database. Once the field survey reports have been processed, the artefacts, coins and pottery are assembled as a Landowner Collection where they are safeguarded for further research and study, a community presentation is arranged where the information is shared and an opportunity is provided for the local community to get involved in future developments.
